### **[NobleHour NobleCause Community Improvement Grants](#)**

NobleHour.com is dedicated to using NobleCause to increase volunteerism that raises awareness at the local level and develops community members who can take action. High schools, higher education institutions, and nonprofits throughout the nation are invited to compete for \$1,000,000 through NobleCause, a grant competition mobilizing volunteers to address the greatest challenges facing their communities. The competition awards 104 organizations with \$6,500 and six organizations will receive \$50,000 grants. Applicants are asked to identify a local issue to address, and to recruit and enrich the social responsibility of volunteers. The grant is a one-time opportunity, and funding is not committed for more than one year. Award winners will be notified in March 2016. Applications can be submitted October 23rd through December 6th, 2015.

### **[Sodexo Foundation Youth Grants](#)**

Youth Service America and the Sodexo Foundation are calling on young people to join the fight to end childhood hunger. Grants will provide \$400 for youth-led service projects that bring together young people, families, Sodexo employees, and other community members to address childhood hunger. Young people between the ages of 5 and 25 in the United States are eligible to apply. Projects will take place on or around Global Youth Service Day, April 15-17, 2016.

### **[U.S. Department of Justice OVW FY 2016 Justice for Families Program](#)**

The program seeks to improve the response of all aspects of the civil and criminal justice system to families with a history of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking, or in cases involving allegations of child sexual abuse. The program supports the following activities for improving the capacity of communities and courts to respond to families affected by the four crimes: court-based and court-related programs; supervised visitation and safe exchange by and between parents; training and technical assistance for people who work with families in the court system; civil legal services; provision of resources in juvenile court matters; and development or promotion of legislation, model codes, policies, and best practices. Eligible applicants are states, units of local government, courts (including juvenile courts), Indian tribal governments, nonprofit organizations, legal services providers, and victim service providers. Award Ceiling: \$600,000

### **U.S. Department of Justice OVW FY 2016 Consolidated Grant Program to Address Children and Youth Experiencing Domestic and Sexual Assault and Engage Men and Boys as Allies**

This consolidated grant program creates a unique opportunity for communities to increase collaboration among non-profit victim service providers; violence prevention and child- and youth-serving organizations; and organizations and programs that support men's role in combating violence against women and girls. Applicants for grant funding are limited to a territorial, tribal or local government entity; or a nonprofit, nongovernmental entity or Indian Tribe or tribal nonprofit organization that has a demonstrated primary goal or history of providing services to children and youth who are victims of and/or exposed to domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, or stalking; or a nonprofit, nongovernmental entity that has a demonstrated history of creating effective public education and/or community organizing campaigns to encourage men and boys to work as allies with women and girls to prevent domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking. Award Ceiling: \$1 million.

Deadline: January (Annually)

### **National Archives and Records Administration Access to Historical Records**

This grant program is designed to support archival repositories in preserving and processing primary source materials. The program emphasizes the creation of online tools that facilitate the public discovery of historical records. The Commission looks to fund projects that undertake one or more of the following activities: Preservation, arrangement, and online description of historical records in all formats; Digital preservation of electronic records and unstable audio or moving image formats. Eligible applicants include: U.S. nonprofit organizations or institutions; U.S. colleges, universities, and other academic institutions; State or local government agencies; Federally-acknowledged or state-recognized Native American tribes or groups. Award ceiling: \$200,000

Deadline: June (Annually)

### **American Pain Society and Rita Allen Foundation 2016 Award in Pain**

Proposed research projects should be directed toward the molecular biology of pain and/or basic science topics related to the development of new analgesics for the management of pain due to terminal illness. Eligible candidates should be in the early stages of their career with an appointment at faculty level. To be eligible, the applicant must demonstrate the strong support of the appropriate administrators and department chair or institute head; should have been on a tenure track for no more than three years; and must conduct the research at an institution in the United States or Canada. Award Ceiling: \$50,000 a year for three years.

### **Winn Feline Foundation 2016 Winn Grant Proposal**

The Winn Feline Foundation enhances the relationship between cats and humans by fostering improvements in feline health through research and education. Applicants may be faculty veterinarians, post-doctoral fellows, practicing veterinarians or veterinary students. Studies applicable to all cats are encouraged. The Foundation is also interested in projects that address issues in individual breeds, nutrition and behavior. Award Ceiling: \$25,000

Deadline: December (Annually)

### **The Children's Trust Innovation Fund**

The Children's Trust seeks a qualified organization to operate a fully staffed, 24-hour call center to provide comprehensive information and social services referrals to families and youth throughout Miami-Dade County in English, Spanish and Creole. The selected applicant must also offer online chat services; maintain an electronic, up-to-date and searchable, mobile-friendly online resource directory; and administer the countywide Help Me Grow initiative, which is tied to a national and statewide system for families and children ages birth-8 concerning health, developmental or behavioral issues. This is a noncompetitive solicitation and applicants may direct questions to [innovationfund@thechildrenstrust.org](mailto:innovationfund@thechildrenstrust.org).

### **The Children's Trust Reading Enhancement Services**

The Children's Trust invites experienced agencies to submit proposals to deliver reading enhancement services at existing summer camps and after-school programs. This includes engaging parents; administering summer reading assessments; and tutoring struggling readers in small group settings the summer prior to their entering K, first and second grades. The selected applicant will also provide staff at after-school programs funded by The Trust with on-site coaching to implement high quality, differentiated literacy instruction. A bidders' conference will be held on Friday, November 6, 2015, from 10 a.m. to noon at The Children's Trust, 3150 SW 3rd Avenue, 8th Floor, Miami, FL 33129.

### **Home Depot Foundation Veteran Housing Grants Program**

The Foundation awards grants to nonprofit organizations for the development and repair of veterans housing. Eligible Projects include: new construction, rehab or repair, single family or multifamily, permanent supportive housing or transitional housing. Grants are awarded solely for the physical construction or repair of housing for veterans (hard costs). THDF does not provide funding for soft costs, such as furnishings, rental subsidies, tenant services, etc. 75% of the project's funding sources have been identified at the time of proposal submission. The amount of funding requested does not exceed \$25,000 per veteran unit. For multifamily rental projects, proposals requesting above \$100,000 must provide evidence of a third party binding agreement that ensures the units are a.) reserved for veterans; b.) occupied by veterans for a minimum of 15 years for rental or 3 years for homeownership ( i.e. project-based HUDVASH, other funder requirement, deed restriction, zoning requirement, etc.). Next Deadlines: February 24, 2016 and June 23, 2016.
